



This tutorial will show you the platinum features of Curation Hero.

Step 1 – Log in to your Wordpress Dashboard.

Step 2 – Navigate to Curation Hero section from the left hand side and click Curation Hero.




Step 3 – You will get this page and as you can see, you have the search option and the settings button on the right side.



Step 4 – Let's go ahead and click Settings button. In this page, you will have the option to choose your Theme, Youtube Order by and the Flickr License Type.

You will also have the ability to add a "Read More" link. Just check the box next to it and enter your preferred word to replace "Read More" only if you wanted to change it. If you want to disable this option, unchecking the box will do the trick.

Once you're done setting it up, hit Save button.



Step 5 – Now, click Google Images tab and you will get this page. You will have some options which I have illustrated below. All you have to do is choose the best option for you and once you're done, hit Save button.



Step 6 – Now, let's do a search to curate. Enter your keywords and as you can see in the Source by, we have these options.




And you will get your search results along with your Post Builder on the right side.




Step 7 – I'm going to show you different way to curate your results.

The first thing that I think it's incredible is that you can drag it from the results area and drop it to your post editor just like this.




Please note that in order for us to do that is we need to be in the Visual tab.




You can repeat the same process (drag and drop) if you wish to add another topic to your post.

Step 8 – If you want get another source, just click the Source By and select your new source. In this example, let's choose Youtube.



And you will get another search results just like this.



Step 9 – Click the button **As Featured Image** to set it as the Featured Image on this post.


Step 10 – Now, we can click “Add to Editor” or simply drag and drop it.



Step 11 – Now, I’m going to go back and select source by Google News.



Step 12 – And you will get a list of results. Let’s click Expand button to one of the result.



Please also note that you have different types of options related to this content. You have the ff:

Main Content – These are the text information of this content.

Images – These are images associated on that content.

Meta – The meta keywords or information of that particular content.


Links – The links associated with that content.

Videos – Any videos on a post like Youtube, Vimeo, etc.

Social – These are social information like Facebook, Twitter, etc.



Step 14 – Let's go back and look for another source. Another thing to note is that you can curate from any of these source. It's totally up to you. In this example, let's select Twitter.




And now we can add a number of tweets to our post as well.


Step 15 – We can choose to “Add All” to your post editor.


Step 16 – Set featured image.




Step 17 – Add a title.




Step 18 – You can also select a number of post and click Add Selected.

Step 19 – Using Curation Hero will give you fully interactive experience without having to reload your browser. Once your post is ready to go, all you have to do is select to save it as Post or Page.



As I said before, you can add as many social accounts that you want so that you can curate contents to those on auto-pop.
